

## Speech by Mr Kwek Leng Joo, Managing Director, City Developments Limited at the Launch of the Singapore Sculpture Award Exhibition at Singapore Art Museum on Wednesday, 11 June 2003 at 7.00pm

This is certainly a reflection of the remarkable potential of our nation's budding sculptors.
